Field trip

The conference will consist of both platform and poster presentations, and a field trip. Poster-viewing opportunities will be provided throughout the conference. All papers will be published in a special edition of *Tasweeds*, and will be eligible for a people's choice prize.

The day of presentations will be followed by a tasty gourmet barbecue, at which the blues band, the *Dudley Nightshades*, will perform.

The field trip begins at 9 am at the Tramsheds conference centre, where it is scheduled to end at 4.30 pm. Participants will tour several sites in the Tamar Valley: some where community and local government groups are managing riparian weeds; another that features a 'new' weed infestation in a rural, roadside and native and plantation forest setting; and yet another on a reserve that bridges suburban land and the estuary (where the future of estuarine weeds will be considered).
